# **Mayor's Charity Concert**

The joint Music Centres performed a fantastic concert on February 17th at the Army Foundation College in Harrogate. The event was in aid of the Mayor of Harrogate's (Cllr. Bernard Bateman) charity, the Army Benevolent Fund and raised over £2000 for this worthy cause.

The Music Centres of Skipton, Harrogate, Whitby, Selby, Northallerton and Scarborough were all represented with some outstanding performances from each group.
The County Youth Big Band and
County Choir also performed as
did the drummers from the Army
Foundation College who opened the
concert with a spectacular display.

In the morning of the concert day, the musicians were treated to a workshop and performance guidance from the Band of the Royal Armoured Corps. The Music Service musicians were able to comment on the bands



rehearsal as they took us through their rehearsal techniques. Ensemble skills such as balance, intonation, listening and phrasing were all highlighted.

The Army musicians then also performed with some of the ensembles, creating a real feeling of partnership on the day.

Ian Bangay (Head of NYCC Music Service) said "it was great to work with the Royal Armoured Corps again. We performed with them in our World War 1 concert last year and were so impressed with their professionalism and musicianship. I know our young musicians will have been inspired yet again by their playing."

We hope very much that this concert will spark some new partnership work between the Army Foundation College and the Music Service, and we would like to thank Lt. Col. Hall, MBE, and all his staff for their support on the day.

#### Musicians talk about their careers in music

For the past two years, two of Northallerton Music Centre French Horn players have featured in the BBC Festival of Remembrance Concerts at The Royal Albert Hall, as well as Remembrance Sunday at The Cenotaph, London.

# Harry Brownlie, Musician at The Royal Airforce

### How old were you when you became interested in music?

I became interested in music at around the age of 6.

# What were your early experiences of music making in North Yorkshire?

My earliest experiences from what I can remember were from playing with my local school band to the

Northallerton Area Wind Orchestra, the Harrogate Area Wind Band for a short period of time and then 2 years with the North Yorkshire County Orchestra. Also having lessons with a private French Horn teacher and travelling to Manchester for a lesson every two weeks.

## How did these experiences shape your plans for later in life?

These experiences playing helped me gain a better understanding of how an orchestra or band works and the building of confidence in my ability to play, as at the time there was only one horn, pretty much, especially in the Area & School bands.

## Why did you decide to go to into the army?

Throughout my childhood and teenage years I had always had an interest in military music especially the RAF. I did trial a couple of days with the Army but it just wasn't for me. I then knew the RAF was the one for me. I had seen them perform a display at the Royal Edinburgh Tattoo in 2004 as a child and had said to my mum 'that looks like a fun' and then throughout my teens I saw the RAF in concert about 4 or 5 times and I then knew that this is what I wanted to do for a living. So, in 2014 I joined the Royal Air Force as a professional French Horn player

and haven't looked back since.



## What are your future plans as a musician?

My future plans as a musician are to continue in the Royal Air Force and gain as many qualifications as I can, plus grabbing every opportunity that's available to me and taking them in my stride. Also to seek lessons outside of work to further my playing ability/confidence/techniques and learn from the top French Horn players.

#### Which musicians have had the greatest influence on you as a musician?

Lizzie Davis, Dennis Brain, Michael Thompson, Richard Dilley, Jonathan Lipton, Pip Eastop etc. I mean I could give you a full page of names but if I was to name one out of these few it would be Lizzie Davis, if it wasn't for her I don't think I would be where I am today. To be honest I also look up a lot to my fellow horn players in the RAF as they've had a lot more experience than me plus everyone has their own little signature move you could say. I also take on board everything that any musician says if I can relate it to my playing that is (mainly brass players though).

# What advice would you give a young musician starting on their musical journey?

I would say find an instrument that you love and really stick to it. I started off with a really old and battered French Horn that I found in my mum's school and took it home and that was it, hooked. You'll find it hard as most things are, but if you stick at it you could not only be an awesome musician but you could also get paid for doing something you love. I've turned my hobby into my dream job - winner!

## What is the most exciting gig you have ever done?

Hmm... there have been so many. I would say playing 'Hymn to the Fallen' from Saving Private Ryan in Washington D.C in a joint concert with the United States Air Force Band and a Veteran of the D-Day landings conducting us - very emotional.

Also up there would be: being involved the RAF100 parade live on BBC ONE last summer, several Changing of the Guard parades with thousands of people looking at you while you march through the streets of London, being involved every year at the Royal Festival

of Remembrance at the Royal Albert Hall and the Cenotaph, also taking part in the Royal Edinburgh Tattoo in 2015 for 4 weeks, every night being sold out.

## What is it like seeing yourself at events on TV or in the press?

At first a little weird to be honest but you get used it.

## Anything else you'd like to mention?

I would just say if your keen for music really try and push yourself as far as possible and you don't have to join the forces like myself. Also if you can find a local band or orchestra centre it's very much worth the time and when you succeed you'll appreciate the time you've put in over the past years - like they say

practice makes perfect, but don't forget to keep practicing your scales!

# NYMAZ Early Years Music Network opportunities

Launched in September 2012, NYMAZ's Early Years Music Network has attracted over 300 members from settings as diverse as primary school staff to arts organisations to community nurseries and childminders, as well as freelance music practitioners and Head Teachers. Regional early years music networking and song share events allow members to meet peers and experienced music practitioners, share practice with each other and pick up new tools, resources, songs and games to use in their own settings.

This network is open to all those working in North Yorkshire with children aged 0 to 5. Basic membership is free, or for a small annual charge (£25 / £10) full

membership provides a range of benefits, including discounted event tickets, free access to online and physical resources, a copy of our NYMAZ early Year Song Book and more.

# Sounding Out!

Young people in rural North Yorkshire will have the chance to experience a range of musical genres and cultures, with the new project - 'Sounding Out'- from youth music charity NYMAZ.

With funding from Arts
Council England, 'Sounding
Out' invites young people to
work alongside professional
musicians in a series of
three music residencies held
throughout half-term holidays
and weekend during 2019.

The three residencies will explore exciting music from Brazil, jazz and folk genres respectively.

Sarah McWatt, Director, NYMAZ explains the thinking behind the residencies, "Sounding Out is designed to introduce our participants to an exciting, diverse range of cultural influences. They will explore different genres of music and the stories behind them, meet role models from backgrounds and communities different to their own and gain a greater awareness of the creative and cultural diversity of the UK."

"Over the course of the residency, they will acquire new instrumental and vocal techniques, develop improvisation and compositional techniques as well as enhancing listening, group musicianship and performance skills. It's a brilliant opportunity, open to young people aged 10 to 18 of all abilities."

In addition, schools will be able to tune into live broadcasts of performances from the instrumentalists before each residency on www.connectresound.live.

Thanks to funding from Arts Council England, plus additional support from Paul Hamlyn Fund and Santander, the music residencies are offered free of charge.
